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What is global health?



- Health concerns and issues in different parts of the world
- Mission trips that focus on global health, strive to meet those needs
- Variety of opportunities:
 - Could serve in a hospital or clinical setting in an underserved nation
 - Could work with community and national leaders to create healthcare initiatives
 - Could serve as a teacher in a classroom in an underserved part of the world
 - Could provide disaster relief
 - Could be an osteopathic or a medical doctor, a dentist, an optometrist, a physical therapist, pharmacist, psychologist, NP, PA, nurse, etc.
 - Participants do not need to be medically qualified



Giving vs Receiving

 The act of giving gifts brings joy and satisfaction to both the giver and the receiver.

While receiving gifts can certainly bring happiness,
 research suggests that the act of giving brings about

even greater levels of joy





Helping others, helps decrease B.P.

- Hypertension affects
 - Estimated 65 million Americans
 - Major contributor to cardiovascular disease
- Helping others can also help you protect yourself from high blood pressure
- Older adults who volunteer for at least 200 hours per year decrease their risk of hypertension by 40%



Reasons to do global heath missions

- The need is great
- Chance to experience a different culture(s), making one more sensitive to people's needs
- Hands on experiences without lab and Xray
- Meet new friends
- Learn, practice a new language
- Observe the pain that people in other countries are experiencing
- Use your gifts and talents to help others
- Teach and over see osteopathic/medical students
- Truly a life changing event



A few of the needs for global health outreach

- Approximately two billion people around the world do not have access to lifesaving health care
- Many people may difficulty receiving care because of poor roads, lack of transportation, fuel, etc.
- Maybe lack of qualified health personnel
- Little, if any potable water.
 - Women and children spend 200 million hours fetching water every day often from sources that are infested with insects, animal waste, and chemicals, and serve as breeding grounds for

waterborne diseases



How did Barbara and I get started in global health outreach

- Bought Barbara, my wife, a water well in Nicaragua for Christmas via a Tulsa, Oklahoma Rotary project
- We, of course, then had to visit the well which supplied 400 families in Leon, Nicaragua area
- Rotarians took us to the well –
 we tested the water, and it was
 clean very rewarding!

Networking with Masaka, Uganda Rotarians



Masaka Rotarians developed gardens with yellow vegies, and we started kids on Vit A



Costs
minimal, but
results
enormous for
150 kids

One year later re-tested the kids, only 2 couldn't see better than 20:200



Foods before (white) vision testing and foods (yellow/orange) after vision testing.







Uganda – Networking with other agencies such as rotary and obtaining grants

- \$52,000 in Blessing of Joy School in Mweurka, Uganda
 - New eco-sand latrines
 - Water storage tanks
 - Educational materials teach hand washing
 - Resource center for teachers





- \$48,000 in St. Lucia School and Village, Uganda
 - Deep well with potable water
 - Coffee/Maize plants
 - Pregnant heifer, goats, pigs
 - New latrines





Obtained Water and Sanitation, Hygiene (WASH) Rotary International (RI) Grant with funding from Sunrise Tulsa Rotary and Masaka Clubs = \$58,000.





Replaced old "smelly" latrines with odor-free Eco-San Latrines







New library resources at Blessings of Joy, School







Building projects St. Lucia (\$48,000)



Villagers are being trained on animal husbandry to care for the swine, goats and heifers







New cooking stoves



Working with local Masaka, Ugandan nurses to have care for school children after we leave





Sunrise Tulsa Rotary passed the "hat" to help fund our Rotarian, Ugandan Dentist to Complete His Surgical Education



- Sunrise raised \$500 and PON matched the \$500 for \$1000.
- In return Hilary, DDS, spends the week with our medical team examining and removing teeth annually
- We coat the teeth of kids with fluoride and apply a cavity "halter", Silver Diamine (OK's Sherri Wise pictured)

Rotary Club of Nagpur, India



- Collected \$1200 from Rotarians and gave the Nagpur Club money to educate, board, provide uniforms and educational materials for 4 children (\$400/child) which will take care of the costs from K1 – 12th grade
- Invested at 12% interest annually© at a Rotarians Bank in India








Diagnosed atrial fabulation (referred to cardiologist) and Paroxysmal Atrial Tachycardia (PAT) in infant (referred to pediatric cardiologist), could have died









17 y/o girl with multiple congenital anomalies, possibly related to agent orange (scoliosis/kyphosis and club feet)





- Was able to be referred to Shriners' hospital in Dallas, Texas for evaluation and recommendations. Family and patient were very happy with recommendation from Shriners
- An osteopathic student wrote up a case presentation and was published in an International Journal



Teaching about anemia to Bangalore, India's nursing students – a learning experience





Medical camp in Bangalore, India and working with Doctor's Without Borders in Athens, Greece for follow-up care of refugees.







Suppling medication to patients in Greece. Make home visit to tent on streets of Athens, Greece. Someone had to stay with tent or it would be stolen.



Suggestions to incorporate global health initiatives

- Involve local health care workers and institutions
- Connect with other organizations and government partners that address sustainability in education, water, and sanitation
- Teams must be knowledgeable of the credentials, scope of practice, and skill comfort levels of team members — Do no harm!
- Discuss cases and treatment each evening after clinics
- Share assessment findings, interventions conducted, and recommendations with community leaders and engage and follow up with them to keep the work going



Further examples of helping developing countries

- Disease-targeted programs allow better use of the scarce resources for health systems
 - By reducing mortality among health-care personnel
 - By reducing the incidence of infectious diseases through prevention interventions
 - By limiting hospitalization rates for appropriately treated individuals



A place to consider volunteering

Cuba

- Although the Cubans have appropriate doctors and a public health system, there are no significant medications or supplies
- Four common conditions seen, and medications needed
 - Hypertension Enalapril
 - Diabetes both type 1 and 2 Metformin/insulin syringes
 - Gerd- omeprazole
 - Feminine hygiene products Days for girls
 - Reading glasses



Typical clinic

- 1. Reading glasses
- 2. pharmacy
- 3. BP checks
- 4. Seeing and talking to the patients about disease management Patients thank you and blessing you so rewarding!



The positive contributions of global health initiatives

- Majority of total health expenditures in most developing countries are funded through households' out-of-pocket payments at the point of consumption
- Global health initiatives subsidize access to essential medicines
- Examples:
 - In Rwanda, a Global Fund has supported the expansion of community health insurance coverage for 3.3 million people on low-incomes, including approximately 300,000 people living with HIV/AIDS and 150,000 orphans
 - About 1/3 of expenditures for global health are devoted to upgrading health-care infrastructures and to training and capacity building for health-care personnel
